THE SERIES vs. USF

- The Wolfpack and the Bulls have met three times on the gridiron, with the Pack posting a 2-1 advantage (0-1 home; 1-0 away; 1-0 neutral). The last matchup was on Sept. 13, 2014, when the Pack won 49-17.
- Following the 2005 campaign, the teams played in the Meineke Car Care Bowl in Charlotte, with NC State notching a 14-0 shutout. That marks the only defensive shutout in 33 bowl games for NC State.
- In 2008, the Bulls came into Carter-Finley ranked No. 13 and smacked the Pack 41-10.
- NC State traveled to Tampa in 2014 and won handily, 49-17. A freshman running back named Jaylen Samuels scored his first career touchdown in that contest (he would go on to score 46 more in his career and end up ranking second in NC State career history in TDs).
- USF cornerback coach George Barlow was on the Wolfpack staff coaching that same position from 2014-19.
- Bulls' AD Michael Kelly has ACC ties - he served as senior associate commissioner and had oversight of football for the league for six years.

NOTING THE WOLFPACK

- The ACC Network will be broadcasting live from Carter-Finley all day on Sept. 2, beginning with the Packer & Durham Show from 7-10 a.m. Later in the day, The Huddle, featuring host Jordan Cornette, and analysts Eric Mac Lain, EJ Manuel and Mark Richt, will set the table for the primetime matchup with a 90-minute pregame show beginning at 6 p.m. The quartet will be back at halftime and following the game to wrap up the day's action from Raleigh.
- The Wolfpack returns 20 starters (including 10 on defense) from last season. Every statistical leader (on a per game basis) returns for 2021.
- Wolfpack head coach Dave Doeren ranks second in career victories in NC State history with 55. He boasts the third-longest tenure among all current ACC coaches.
- Nine different players are on 15 different preseason watch lists for national awards (three different players - Grant Gibson, Zonovan Knight and Payton Wilson appear on three lists apiece).
- The Wolfpack coaching staff - head coach Dave Doeren + 10 assistant coaches - boasts 299 years of collective coaching experience.
- Nine different players have been named to 15 different preseason watch lists for national awards.
- After giving up 35.6 points per game in the first seven games of 2020, the defense held the opposition to 20.2 ppg in the last five outings.
- Six games in 2020 were one-score games. The Pack was 4-2 in those contests.
- RB Zonovan Knight scored seven (of his 10) rushing touchdowns in the last six games.

- His 2020 squad set a school record with seven ACC wins.
- His players have won three national awards (Bradley Chubb won the Nagurski & Hendricks Award in 2017 and Garrett Bradbury won the Rimington Award in 2018).
- Has had 21 players drafted by the NFL, including 14 in the last four drafts.
- Boasts two first-round draft picks.

THURSDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

Under Dave Doeren, NC State posts a 7-1 record in season openers. This season marks the second Thursday night opener during his tenure.

In all, the Wolfpack has played on Thursday nights six previous times under Doeren, posting a 3-3 mark in those matchups - 3-2 mark at Carter-Finley Stadium.

The Wolfpack has posted a 12-12 record in Thursday night ESPN games, including a 10-7 mark at home and a 5-3 mark against top 25 teams.

EXPERIENCED LEADERS

NC State may have one of the most experienced coaching staffs in the nation for 2021. The Wolfpack's 10 + head coach Dave Doeren combine to boast 299 years of coaching experience. That's one year shy of THREE CENTURIES!

The Wolfpack returns all but one full-time position coaches from a year ago, as assistant head coach/wide receivers coach Joker Phillips is the only new face. But even though the staff is basically the same from a year ago, the entire staff has turned over since 2018.

STACKED AT STARTER

With last year not counting against players in terms of eligibility, many schools are returning more starters than a typical year. In that atypical year, the Wolfpack still has an overwhelming number of starters returning.

The only four season starters lost from last year's squad are QB Bailey Hockman, TE Cary Angeline, OG Joe Sculthorpe and DT Alim McNeill. Three of those four were in NFL training camps this year. That means eight starters on offense, 10 on defense and both specialists return from an eight-win squad.

In addition to returning starters, the Wolfpack returns almost all of its production. In fact, the statistical leader in every single category (on a per game basis) returns for 2021.

The Wolfpack returns more than 80% of it's total production in all but one statistical category.

WATCH OUT FOR THE WOLFPACK

NC State made its presence known on the preseason watch lists for national awards, as nine different players were named to the lists for 15 different awards.

Three members of the squad - C Grant Gibson, RB Zonovan Knight and LB Payton Wilson - each garnered the nods on *three* different watch lists: the Outland, Lombardi and Rimington for Gibson, the Doak Walker, Maxwell and Hornung for Knight and the Bednarik, Butkus and Nagurski for Wilson

TALENTED TRANSFERS

The Wolfpack got a nice injection of talent from four-year transfers for 2021, with all four newcomers vying for starting jobs in fall camp.

On the defensive side, the secondary added the talents of SAF Cyrus Fagan (FSU) and CB Derrek Pitts (WVU/Marshall) in January, while the d-line added bulk, talent and experience when DL Cory Durden (FSU) transferred in June.

Add DE Daniel Joseph - who transferred from Penn State in 2020 - and there is the possibility of four transfers starting or playing significant time on defense in 2021.

Over on offense, Chandler Zavala could be the starter at guard for the opener after transferring from Fairmont State in June. (Although he is a JUCO transfer, Anthony Belton also made the two-deep for the season opener.)

LOADED LINEBACKERS

Name a more talented trio of linebackers in college football than NC State's. We'll wait.

The Wolfpack returns three hard-hitting starters at the linebacker spot, led by the ACC's leading tackler from 2020: Payton Wilson. A first-team All-ACC choice last season, Wilson has been named to the preseason watch lists for the Butkus, Bednarik and Nagurski awards and ranks second among all returning Power 5 linebackers in tackles at or behind the line of scrimmage in 2020 (25).

The guy who ranks first in that category? That would be the guy next to him: MLB Isaiah Moore (27). Moore was second on the team in tackles last season and ranked 10th in the ACC. He and Wilson are both preseason All-ACC choices by Athlon.

At SLB, Drake Thomas is no slouch either. Thomas' numbers were slowed by injuries last season (he missed two games) but he still finished the season ranked among the ACC leaders in tackles and tackles for loss.

SPECIAL TRIO

One of the Wolfpack's top weapons heading into 2021 is the return of its talented trio of specialists, who will be in their third year working together. Christopher Dunn handles the placekicks, Trenton Gill is the punter and holder, while Joe Shimko is the guy who delivers the ball from his long snapper spot.

Dunn is the school record holder in field goals, Gill enters the 2020 season holding the best career punt average in school history (46.3 ypp) and Shimko ... well there aren't a lot of statistical categories for long snappers but in 223 career snaps, not a single one has been bobbled.

TURNING THE CORNER

At times in the last two seasons, it seemed that there were more members of NC State's cornerback group in street clothes rather than in uniform. In 2021, however, the Pack seems to have turned the corner on that trend.

Fifth-year CB Chris Ingram started 12 of 13 games in 2018 and returned as a starter in 2019 - earning the nod in the first six games before tearing an ACL in the first half of the Syracuse game. The Salisbury native ended up missing the rest of that season, plus the entire 2020 campaign, but is back for the 2021 season.

Fourth-year corner Tashaun Smith was also injured vs. Syracuse in 2019, missing the final six games. He entered 2020 as a starter, starting the season opening win vs. Wake Forest, but suffered an injury 56 snaps into the game and missed the next 11 games. He is also back in action this fall.

While those two were sidelined last season, young Shyheim Battle (just a RS-freshman at the time) ended up getting thrown into the fire, starting all 12 games of the season.

Throw in transfer Derrek Pitts, a grad transfer who joined the Pack from Marshall in January, and has become one of the team's defensive leaders, and there is strong competition at corner.

SECOND(ARY) TO NONE

NC State's group of returning and transfer safeties and cornerbacks boast a combined 84 career starts vs. Power 5 teams. That makes them the seventh-most experienced group (in terms of starts) in the nation this season.

In terms of overall starts, the Wolfpack secondary boasts 91 (CB Derrek Pitts had seven starts during his stint at Marshall).

SUPER SENIORS

With the 2020 season not counting against eligibility, seniors who chose to return for another year have been dubbed 'Super Seniors' by the NCAA.

The Wolfpack will benefit from the talents of several of those veterans, including one who has been around so long we're calling him a Super DUPER senior.

WR Emeka Emezie is in his fifth year playing with the Wolfpack, DE Daniel Joseph is in his second year at NC State, but his sixth year in college after he transferred from Penn State.

And then you've got OT Tyrone Riley, who is back for his *seventh* year, after missing two seasons with injuries. There are two other sixth-year players on the 2021 squad who are technically not Super Seniors. The 2020 season was the fifth in the careers of WR C.J. Riley, III, and TE Dylan Parham, but each was awarded a sixth year prior to the COVID shutdown. So with last season not counting, they each have two seasons left to play.

IN THE RECORD BOOKS

The Wolfpack returns some of the top players in school history for 2021.

- Senior wide receiver Emeka Emezie ranks fifth in the Wolfpack record books in receptions (169), while his 2,093 receiving yards is the seventh-best mark in school history.
- Sophomore Zonovan Knight currently posts the top yards per carry average in Wolfpack career history (for players with a minimum of 200 attempts): 5.49.
- Graduate student Thayer Thomas posts the seventh-best career punt return average in school history at 10.9 yards per return.
- Kicker Christopher Dunn is NC State career record holder in field goals with 56 and ranks third in school history in career points scored (290).
- Punter Trenton Gill's 46.3 yard career punt average is the best in school history.

THE BREAKFAST CLUB

Every Sunday during the football season, the Wolfpack offensive staff hands out bottles of syrup to his players in commemoration of their pancake blocks from the previous game.

At this point in his career, third-year tackle Ikem "Ickey" Ekwonu would need a LOT of pancakes to use up all the syrup he's received. He has 87 pancakes + 22 knockdowns in his 24 career contests.

GIVE A DAWG A BONE

Defensive coordinator Tony Gibson says he wants 'dawgs' on his defense, aka tenacious, relentless, aggressive players. To commemorate those who play with those characteristics, the defensive staff introduced TAKEAWAY BONE in 2020.

When a Wolfpack defender recovers a fumble or intercepts a pass, the BONE comes out on the sideline. The player who got the takeaway signs it and at the end of the season, whoever has signed it the most times gets to keep the bone.

BROTHERS

The Pack has a Thomas brother starting on both sides of the ball: Thayer at WR and Drake at linebacker. Thayer enters his fifth season with 22 career starts, while Drake has 13 in season three. They have started the same game 10 times (eight times in 2020, twice in 2019).

When they started together for the first time versus Louisville on 11/16/2019, it marked the first time a pair of brothers in 12 years. The last time had been when DaJuan and DeAndre Morgan started at SAF and CB in 9/29/2007 vs. Louisville.

The last time brothers had started on opposite sides of the ball was earlier in 2007, when Pat Bedics started at FB and John Bedics started at DT.

Prior to that, you have to go back to 1995 to find a starting set of brothers. That year, brothers Jonathan and Kenneth Redmond started on the offensive line.

PAYTON'S PLACE

Watching the Wolfpack defense, you can't help but notice No. 11 all over the field, flying around sideline to sideline. RS-sophomore Payton Wilson, who has been called a throwback to the old school of linebackers, is one of college football's top tacklers, with the stats (if not the recognition) to prove it.

In 2020 - his first season as a full-time starter - Wilson led the ACC in both total tackles (108) and tackles per game (10.8). He finished fourth in the FBS in total tackles, seventh in solo stops (57), and 13th in tackles per game. In the final regular season game, he dislocated both of his shoulders, but continued to pop them back in and play.

SIX DEGREES OF WOLFPACK NATION: The Wolfpack’s experienced coaching staff may not have spent too many years together at NC State, but many members of the staff worked together prior to coming to Raleigh.

But just because these coaches are new to NC State doesn’t mean they’re new to each other. In fact, eight of the assistant coaches have coached with at least one other assistant coach (or head coach Dave Doeren) at a previous stop. Also, the Pack’s Assistant to the Head Coach Ruffin McNeill has previous coaching ties with the current staff.

Wilson was named an All-ACC first-team selection by both the ACC and AP, and was named ACC Linebacker of the Week three times in 2021, including each of the Pack’s last two games of the regular season.

Despite only starting one game in 2019 as a redshirt-freshman, Wilson also led the Pack in tackles (69). Wilson is the first Pack player to lead NC State in tackles in back-to-back seasons since Audie Cole in 2010 and 2011.

Wilson sat out this spring after undergoing surgery on both shoulders following 2021.

LEARY’S ABILITY

They say that sometimes the greatest ability is *dependability*, and Wolfpack QB Devin Leary was definitely that in his four games played last season.

Even though his 2020 season was cut short due to injury, Leary posted the third-best single-season efficiency mark in school history (148.33), while his 1.82 interception avoidance mark ranks seventh for a single season.

However, Leary’s greatest ability during his Wolfpack career so far might be *adaptability*.

In Leary’s first three years with the program, he worked under three different quarterback coaches (Elijah Drinkwitz in 2018, Kurt Roper in 2019 and Tim Beck in 2021), had three different offensive coordinators (Drinkwitz, Des Kitchings and Beck) and learned three different offenses.

In 2020, the word for Leary is *stability*, as he has settled into Beck’s offensive system and gained confidence in his role as the starter.

DUNN DID IT

In his last game of the 2020 regular season, kicker Christopher Dunn connected on the 56th field goal of his career to set a new Wolfpack record. With those 56 kicks, he ranks second among all returning ACC players in 2021.

A preseason candidate for the Lou Groza Award, Dunn enters his fourth year with the program with several other records in reach. He ranks third in school history in points scored with 290, just 42 points from Niklas Sade’s school record. He ranks second in PATs with 122 (out of 122 attempts) - just 45 from the school mark held by Sade.

Dunn’s .836 field goal percentage ranks fourth in school history. That mark would likely be higher if he had not missed two FGs in the bowl game while playing with a torn groin muscle.

FEELING ICKEY

When The Athletic’s Bruce Feldman did the writeup for his 2021 “Freaks” list, he called NC State’s Ikem Ekwonu (better known as Ickey) “the most dominant O-lineman in college football” and said “it’s a treat for scouts and coaches to watch him maul opponents.”

Ekwonu - who is on the ‘21 watch lists for the Outland and Lombardi Awards - is truly a force at left tackle for the Pack. He notched 50 pancake blocks and 22 knockdowns last season, earning second-team AP All-ACC honors at guard *and* tackle.

And he doesn’t only boast the brawn, but he’s got the brains to match. Ekwonu has been named to the ACC All-Academic team each of the past two years.

MR. NICE GUY

Ask any player on the NC State football team who the nicest guy in the program is, and they will undoubtedly have the same answer: Grant Gibson. The Wolfpack’s fifth-year center always has a smile on his face, always has a positive word and is just generally a likable guy.

He earned the athletic department’s “Heart of the Pack” award, given to the student-athlete who is a good teammate, gives great effort and has an exceptional attitude.

But don't let the niceness fool you. Gibson is a beast on the field. The former defensive lineman is on the preseason watch lists for the Outland Trophy, the Rimington Trophy and the Lombardi Award. ESPN ranked him the third-best returning interior lineman in the country and the Sporting News and PFF named him a second-team preseason All-American.

"Gibby" allowed just four pressures on 443 pass block snaps in 2020 (the only center in the ACC with a better mark played half as many snaps as his 857). Pro Football Focus named him the ninth-best center in the country following the season.

BAM RIGHT

If you've ever watched RB Zonovan Knight play football, you would think his nickname "Bam" came from his explosive ability on the field.

The third-year player boasts the top career yards per carry average in school history (5.49) and his 26.6 yards per kick return is second in the record books. He's led the team in rushing the past two seasons - even though he's come off the bench - and he's on the preseason watch lists for three national awards: the Doak Walker, Maxwell and Paul Hornung.

But the nickname was actually given to him as a toddler. When young Knight was put in a playpen, he constantly banged his toys on the side, prompting an uncle to say "All you hear from him is 'Bam! Bam!'" The nickname - although it was later shortened - stuck.

EVERY GAME EMEZIE

One of the Wolfpack's Super Seniors for 2021, wideout Emeka Emezie enters his final campaign ranked fifth in school history with 169 career receptions, seventh in receiving yards (2,093) and 12th in TD catches (13).

He has caught a pass in 32 straight games, which ranks as the fifth-longest streak in the nation and the fifth longest streak in school history.

SUPER DUPER SENIOR

Back to Tyrone Riley - the guy in his seventh year on the team.

Riley joined the Pack as a defensive end in 2015, redshirting that season. In 2016, while playing on defense he tore his bicep and missed time. He played in all 13 games - mainly on special teams - in 2017, blocking a punt against Boston College. In 2018, he underwent shoulder surgery and missed spring drills, then had a bout of pneumonia in preseason camp, but ended up playing in 13 games and starting two at offensive tackle.

He entered 2019 preseason camp as the probable starter at left tackle, but suffered a season-ending football injury on the second day of practice and missed the entire season after undergoing surgery. He came back strong in 2020, starting the first five games of the season before a season-ending foot injury against Duke.

Before his final season at NC State is over, Riley will be 25 years old. To put it in perspective, fellow offensive lineman Lyndon Cooper, who joined the Wolfpack in January, was 11 years old when Riley started at NC State. Nyheim Hines, who was in the same recruiting class with Riley, will play his fourth NFL season in 2021-22!

Riley is one of just eight players nationally in his seventh year at the same school, joining OL Bryce Harris (Toledo), WR Jonathon Hodoh (ULM), OL Ken Marks (Louisiana), DL Ralfs Rusins (Liberty), OL Tyrell Smith (Virginia Tech), WR Tre Tipton (Pitt), and SAF Cristian Williams (Tulsa).

POSITIONLESS PENNIX

Although he used to be listed as a running back on the roster, expect to see Trent Pennix in various spots all over the field in 2021. His versatility in his fourth season of action brings a new dynamic to the Pack attack.

Pennix plays the H-back role made popular by former Pack utility man Jaylen Samuels (now with the Pittsburgh Steelers). Samuels, who ended up setting the school record for receptions during his career (2014-17) actually spoke with Pennix during the offseason, giving him advice about learning from both positions.

Pennix has been active in the passing game throughout his career, with all of his touchdowns coming on receptions.

MORE ON VERSATILITY

The Pack's versatility extends to the offensive line as well. Ikem 'Ickey' Ekwonu started all 12 games last year, but they came at two different positions - the first four games at left guard and then at left tackle for the last eight games. Just a season removed from starting the final seven games as a true freshman at left tackle in 2019, he ended up earning second-team All-ACC honors at *both* spots in 2020.

The swiss-army-knife of the offensive line unit is Bryson Speas, who has 12 starts over the last two seasons at three different positions on the O-Line (10 at right tackle, 1 at left guard and 1 at right guard).

#PACKUNITED

#PackUnited, a student-led initiative through the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, focuses on denouncing racism and police brutality while also promoting racial unity. LB Isaiah Moore and C Grant Gibson were driving forces behind the movement's inception and it's growth since the spring of 2021.

#PackUnited encourages NC State's student-athletes to use their platform to push for change and is focused on three platforms: awareness, action, and education.

Awareness: Increasing awareness of racial injustice and racial inequity, through education and social media campaigns that tell the stories of our

NOTING THE PACK

Black student athletes as well as Black community members.

Education: Teaming with local and community resources to educate and better articulate the narratives surrounding social injustice in black communities.

Action: Taking the initiative as student-athletes to step up and commit to improving the community through continued service for those in need.

NO. 1

Since 2014, NC State head coach Dave Doeren has honored a member of the Wolfpack squad by giving them the No. 1 jersey. Last season, linebacker Isaiah Moore was awarded that special number and he will wear it again in 2021.

Moore was only the second underclassman to earn the privilege (Jaylen Samuels wore the No. 1 jersey as a junior and senior). He returns in 2021 for this fourth year as a starter and was the second-leading tackler on the team last season.

Moore has also been the de facto leader of the team's involvement in the #PackUnited movement, which stands out against racial violence and social justice.

#DLU

Heading into the 2021 season, eight former Wolfpack defensive linemen are currently on NFL squads. Seven have been drafted over the last four years, including three in the last two NFL Drafts.

Highlighting the group are the four d-linemen drafted in 2018 - all now entering their fourth NFL seasons. Bradley Chubb made his first Pro Bowl last season with the Denver Broncos, Justin Jones is a projected starter for the L.A. Chargers, while B.J. Hill (N.Y. Giants) and Kentavious Street (San Francisco 49ers) look to provide depth with their squads.

The 2020 draft saw Larrell Murchison selected by the Tennessee Titans and James Smith-Williams by the Washington Football Team. Alim McNeill was a third-round selection by the Detroit Lions this past spring and could end up starting.

Although he went undrafted in 2015, T.Y. McGill is entering his seventh NFL season and his second with the Philadelphia Eagles.

An additional defensive lineman moved over to the offensive line once he made it to the NFL. J.R. Sweezy played on the defensive side of the ball for the Pack from 2009-11, but was drafted by the Seattle Seahawks as a guard on offense.

- Graduate transfer Chandler Zavala is the son of Demetrio Zavala, a chef and “Chopped” Grand Champion on the Food Network. (Rumor has it that Chef Zavala is planning to cook for the entire team at some point this season).
- LB Levi Jones blocked three kicks last season - the third-highest mark in school history.
- Payton Wilson’s brother Bryse is a pitcher for the Pittsburgh Pirates (formerly the Atlanta Braves).
- LT Ikem “Ickey” Ekwonu’s twin brother Osita is a linebacker at Notre Dame. His sister, Adaora, is enrolled in the UChicago Pritzker School of Medicine and his older brother, Chike, is a 2D animator in Atlanta.
- Backup QB Ben Finley is the younger brother of Ryan Finley, who started at quarterback at NC State from 2016-18 and ranks second in school history with 10,505 career passing yards.
- Grant Gibson’s grandfather, Harvey Gantt, was the first black student to attend Clemson University and the first black mayor of Charlotte. The Gantt Center for African-American Arts+Culture is named in his honor. His mother Sonja was a long-time news anchor, working at WGN in Chicago and WCNC in Charlotte.
- During the COVID shutdown in 2020, P Trenton Gill raised over \$8,000 to purchase 1,000 meals for needy families in his hometown of Hillsborough, N.C. By doing so, he also helped supply business for eight restaurants in his hometown.
- Daniel Joseph was the fourth-pick in the 2021 CFL Draft (BC Lions).
- TE Dylan Parham has added 55 lbs. to his frame since he came to NC State as a quarterback in 2016.
- OT Tyrone Riley is in his seventh season with the program. He was awarded a sixth year of eligibility due to injuries, then got another year because of COVID.
- Identical twins Cedd and Fred Seabrough are the same height, same weight, play the same position and wear jersey numbers 47 and 48 respectively.
- Wolfpack running back Zonovan Knight earned his nickname at an early age. When left in a playpen, he would constantly bang his toys, prompting his uncle to remark ‘All I hear is ‘Bam! Bam!’” The nickname “Bam Bam” stuck and was later shortened to Bam.

CARTER-FINLEY STADIUM

One of the landmarks of North Carolina's capital city, Carter-Finley Stadium has gained a national reputation as being one of the toughest places to play. The home of the Wolfpack, which celebrated its 50th birthday in 2016, boasts 57,600 permanent seats and is surrounded by acres of convenient parking.

The playing surface at Carter-Finley Stadium was reconstructed in 2009. Named for Wolfpack alumnus Wayne T. Day in 2002, it is built to USGA specifications for a golf green.

The south end zone is the home of the 103,254 square-foot Murphy Center, which is the football team's home for training and preparation.

NC State practices just a stone's throw away at the Wolfpack Practice Complex and the mammoth Close-King Indoor Practice Facility. The outdoor complex covers seven acres and boasts three full fields, a training room, restrooms and a video/coaching tower. The indoor facility boasts a full, 120-yard football field and roof height sufficient for kicking game, with suspended goal posts, additional training and conditioning space beyond both end zones

The A.E. Finley Fieldhouse in the north end zone houses two spacious, state-of-the-art locker rooms that can be divided into smaller locker rooms when NC State plays host to high school championship games. There are also halftime locker room areas for the cheerleaders, the dance team, game referees and coaches.

HEAD COACH DAVE DOEREN

- In his ninth season at NC State, his 11th season as a head coach overall.
- Ranks second among the longest tenured coaches in NC State history behind Earle Edwards (17, 1954-70).
- Also ranks second in Wolfpack history in coaching victories (55).
- In the past four seasons, has had 14 players drafted by the NFL - including an ACC-best seven in 2017 (the sixth-highest total nationally that season). 21 total have been drafted during his tenure at NC State.
- NC State has boasted 35 Academic All-ACC performers under his guidance and in 2018, Ryan Finley was named to the prestigious NFF National Scholar-Athlete Team.
- The 2020 Wolfpack set a school record with seven ACC wins (7-3).
- With nine victories, the 2018 Wolfpack was one of just six teams in the 126-year history of NC State football to post nine or more regular season wins. It marked the first time since 1991-92 that State posted back-to-back nine-win seasons (only the third time in school history).
- His Wolfpack teams qualified for five consecutive bowl games - the second-longest bowl streak in school history - and have qualified for six total (in eight seasons).
- Has coached bowl eligible teams in 15 of his 19 years in Division I.
- One of his players won one of college football's national award in 2017 and 2018: Bradley Chubb (2017 Nagurski & Hendricks) and Garrett Bradbury (2018 Rimington).
- In 2014, the Wolfpack posted its best rushing average since 1992.
- Members of his teams have turned in over 8,000 collective hours of community service during his tenure at NC State.
- Led Northern Illinois to the most successful two years in program history.
- His first Husky squad won the school's first MAC Championship since 1983 and tied the school record with 11 wins.
- His 2012 NIU team repeated as league champ and set a new school mark with 12 victories, earning a trip to the Orange Bowl - the first BCS berth ever for a MAC school.
- Was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards in 2012.
- NIU boasted the nation's longest conference winning streak (17) and never lost a home game during his tenure.
- Spend five seasons in the Big Ten, serving as defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Wisconsin.
- The Badgers posted a 49-15 mark while he was on staff.
- Spent four seasons at Kansas and was on staff when the Jayhawks ended a seven-year bowl drought.
- In 2000 and 2001, coached the secondary at NCAA Division I-AA powerhouse Montana. The Grizzlies advanced to the national title game in 2000, losing by two points, but returned in 2001 to win the championship.
- Montana posted a 28-3 record and won two Big Sky titles during his tenure.
- Planned to go to medical school following college and become an orthopedic surgeon. He took the MCAT but after helping coach high school between his junior and senior years, fell in love with coaching.
- Lettered at tight end at Drake and was an Academic All-American.
- Earned his undergraduate degree in pre-medical biology. Earned his master's from Drake in educational leadership and began work on a Ph.D. while serving as a graduate assistant at the University of Southern California.
