BULLS WELCOME RETURN OF THEIR OWN TO TAMPA

When the Bulls and Bison meet for the first time ever, it will mark a homecoming for four Howard coaches. Bison Head Coach Larry Scott was a member of USF's original team, playing offensive tackle for the Bulls from 1997-99. The 2000 USF graduate went on to serve on the Bulls' coaching staff from 2005-12, helping USF reach six-straight bowl games and climb to the No. 2 national ranking in 2007. Bison wide receiver coach Lindsey Lamar was a RB/WR/KR for the Bulls from 2009-12, earning Big East Special Teams Player of the Year honors in 2010. A 2012 USF graduate, he went on to serve on the coaching staff for four years (2015-19). Howard's special teams/defensive line coach Vernon Hargreaves served on the USF coaching staff from 2010-12 in the same capacity and his son, Vernon III, was born in Tampa, played at Wharton HS and for the University of Florida, and was the No. 11 overall pick at cornerback by the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the 2016 NFL Draft. Bison defensive coordinator Troy Douglas was on staff at USF as a secondary coach from 2006-08.

- EXPLOSIVE SPECIAL TEAMS: Jimmy Horn Jr.'s 89-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to start the second half in the Bulls' season opening loss to BYU marked USF's fourth kickoff return for a touchdown in the last eight games. Brian Battie led the nation and earned Consensus All-America honors in 2021 after posting three.
- WEAVER CLIMBS CHARTS: Junior wide receiver Xavier Weaver led USF with 715 receiving yards in 2021, the fifth-best season in program history, and posted a career-best 113 yards on five catches in the season-opener, moving him into 14th all-time on the career receiving chart with 1,130 yards. A season similar to last year would move him into the top four all-time at USF and he currently stands 1,006 yards behind all-time leader Andre Davis (2,136, 2011-14).

THE PROGRAM

In its 26th season and 23rd at the FBS level, USF Football has made 10 bowl appearances, including a string of four straight (2015-18) and every season between 2005-10 (6 straight). USF has won six bowl games and produced 15 All-America selections, 30 NFL Draft picks and reached the No. 2 ranking in the Associated Press Poll in 2007.

LAST TIME OUT

DELAYED SEASON-OPENER ENDS IN 50-21 LOSS TO BYU

USF and BYU had to wait an extra 2:36 to kickoff the 2022 season as inclement weather delayed a scheduled 4 p.m. at Raymond James Stadium to 6:36 p.m. with lightning in the Bay Area. The teams took the field to 31,521 enthusiastic fans, but BYU quickly turned them silent, using their first offensive possession for a 75-yard, jet-sweep touchdown by wide receiver Puka Nacua .BYU built a 28-0 lead in the first quarter after a strong performance from their offense as the Bulls offense struggled to get first downs. Following the big strike on the opening possession, BYU quarterback Jaren Hall drove the Cougars 65 and 82-yards for two touchdowns sandwiched around a 33-yd pick-six by linebacker Max Tooley that gave BYU an early 28-0 lead. USF got the offense going on the last drive of the half as quarterback Gerry Bohanon, a Baylor transfer making his first start at USF, moved the Bulls 84 yards in eight plays, connecting with wide receiver Xavier Weaver for 71 of those yards.

- Weaver ended the night with his second career 100-yd game, posting 113 yards on five receptions.
- BYU out-gained USF 575 to 293 on the night, including 314 yards rushing.
- Jimmy Horn Jr. returned the opening kickoff of the second half 89 yards for a touchdown, the first of his career.
- Mekhi LaPointe led USF with 10 tackles and his sixth career interception.

STORY LINES

- Indoor Facility Nears Completion: On Sept. 8, 2021 USF officially broke ground on a \$22 million Indoor Performance Facility on the site of the Bulls current turf practice field. The facility is set to open later this fall and followed on the heels of a \$3 million locker room renovation that opened prior to the start of the 2021 season.
- On-Campus Stadium Coming: On Sept. 8, 2021, USF Board of Trustees Chair Will Weatherford told a gathered audience of nearly 300, "Bulls Nation deserves to have a stadium on this campus. There's a renowned author named Victor Hugo who once said, 'There's nothing more powerful than an idea whose time has come.' Our time has come. These student-athletes ... our 50,000 students ... the alumni, faculty and administration, they all deserve a tod it." Since then, stadium planning has moved forward at a fast pace with a site identified on the east end of campus within the current Athletics District and on the site of the fields the first Bulls teams practiced on. Selection of a build/design firm is the next step coming this fall and the university has targeted 2026 for a stadium opening.
- Scott Begins Third Year: The fifth head coach in program history, Jeff Scott begins his third season at the helm. He took the Bulls through just his second spring practice in March and April and had his first season with a complete year of offseason training under the Bulls belts since the COVID pandemic struck in 2020.
- Lots of Production Returns: USF returns 10 starters on offense and eight on defense as well as its starting kicker and punter. According to ESPN's Bill Connelly, USF ranks fifth nationally returning 88 percent of its production from 2021.
- Roster Numbers (112 & 21): The Bulls opened spring practice with 112 Bulls on campus participating, including 21 early enrollees from the Class of 2022, the largest number of early enrollees to compete in spring drills in program history. Among those arriving on campus in January were 13 FBS transfers.
- D-Line Rebuild: The Bulls return their top six tacklers on defense, but lost four primary players on the defensive line, including 28 starts in 2021 and a total of 75 career starts. However, the unit generated just 20.5 TFL and six sacks in 2021. The Bulls added 12 defensive linemen in 2022, including transfers Nick Bags (Temple), Rashad Cheney (Minnesota), Jatorian Hansford (Missouri), and Jonathan Ross (Bowie State), high school recruits in fourstar defensive end Michael Williams II, Eddie Kelly and Jacquez Williams and 6-9, 286-pound former USF basketball player Bayron Matos. Seniors Rashawn Yates (an Athlon 4th team All-AAC pick in 2021) and Darrien Grant, junior Jason Vaughn and sophomore Tramel Logan anchor the returners.

- New Coordinators: The Bulls will be installing schemes from two new coordinators. Defensive coordinator Bob Shoop joined the Bulls in December and brings 17 seasons of coordinator experience including stops at Mississippi State, Tennessee, Penn State and Vanderbilt. Offensive coordinator Travis Trickett joined the Bulls in January leaving his alma mater West Virginia after three seasons. He has seven seasons of offensive coordinator experience under his belt, most recently at FAU and Georgia State. Scott also welcomed former Arkansas and SMU head coach and Clemson offensive coordinator Chad Morris as a senior offensive analyst in the summer.
- Senior Linebackers: Senior linebackers Dwayne Boyles Jr. and Antonio Grier Jr. have led USF in tackles, TFL and sacks in the last three seasons, including posting 68 and 92 tackles, respectively, last year. They are the leaders and anchors of the USF defense as they bring a combined 55 starts and 416 tackles, 43.5 TFL and 13 sacks into their senior seasons. They will have the most competition and depth behind them in their careers with the addition of Minnesota transfer DJ Gordon and Coffeyville CC transfer Jhalyn Shuler.
- Veteran O-Line Provides Foundation: All five starters reum on the offensive line LT Donovan Jennings (312), LG Demetris Harris (315), C Brad Cecil (294), RG Dustyn Hall (303) and RT Demontrey Jacobs (315) return representing a combined 136 career starts. Jennings, Harris and Cecil have started alongside each other for the past four seasons and each bring at least 31 starts into 2022 with Harris (41) and Cecil (38) leading all Bulls returners in career starts. The unit gave up just 25 sacks in 2021 and led a program-record 421-yard rushing effort at Temple. Allen Mogridge returns as offensive line coach for the third year, the longest tenured offensive line coach at USF since Steve Shankweiler served 2010-12.
- Deep Secondary: Five players that started a least four games in 2021 return in the secondary, including senior captain Mekhi LaPointe (21 career starts) and junior corner Daquan Evans (12 career starts). Safeties Matthew Hill and TJ Robinson and cornerback Christian Williams alsaw significant starts and time in 2021 and will be joined by the return of safety Will Jones, who missed 2021 with a knee injury. The Bulls also added impact players in the 2022 Class to the secondary, including transfers Aamaris Brown (Kansas State) and Ray Thornton (Clemson).
- Strong Running Back Room: The Bulls return their top four rushers from 2021 and 93 percent of their rushing yards and 24 of their 25 rushing TDs from 2021. Senior Jaren Mangham led the Bulls with 671 yards and 15 TD, while Kelley Joiner and Brian Battie both ran for more than 300 yards and all contributed to a program rushing record of 421 yards vs. Temple last season. That group is bolstered by the return of freshman K'Wan Powell from injury and the additions of Clemson transfer Michel Dukes (a top 50 running back out of high school) and freshman Jason Albritton.



#HORNSUP: USF ALL ACCESS

The USF football TV show follows head coach Jeff Scott and the Bulls inside the program with unique access and features. The show airs <u>Sunday nights at 9 p.m. on WTTA Great 38</u> in the Bay area and segments are posted throughout the week on USF Football social channels (Twitter, Facebook and Instagram) throughout the season.

NOTING THE OPPONENT: HOWARD

Howard University, located in Washington D.C., began playing football in 1893. The Bison, a member of the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference, made history in 2017 by defeating Football Bowl Subdivision opponent UNLV, a 45.5-point favorite, 43-40. Howard was a five-time Black College National Champion (1920, 1925, 1926, 1993, 1996) and it won the MEAC in 1993

- Howard enters Saturday's game at 0-2 after defeats against Alabama State (23-13 in the MEAC/SWAC Challenge at Atlanta) and Hampton (31-28). Against Hampton, the Bison rallied with 22 fourth-quarter points, including a pair of touchdown passes in the last four minutes. Senior quarterback Quinton Williams had a career-high four touchdown passes, including a pair to 6-foot-7 tight end Christion Carter.
- Howard was picked fifth in the MEAC's preseason poll. The Bison had five players named to the first-team All-MEAC defensive back Kenny Gallop Jr., wide receiver Antoine Murray, defensive lineman Darren Brokenburr, offensive tackle Anim Dankwah and guard Darius Fox, while running back Jaret Hunter, return specialist Ian Wheeler and center Deshawn Ingram were named to the second team.
- In 2021, Williams completed 176 of 301 passes for 2,353 yards and 16 touchdowns in leading the MEAC's second-best passing offense. Williams has his top two receivers returning Murray (33 catches for 629 yards and seven touchdowns in 2021) and Matthew McDonald (20 catches for 288 yards and four touchdowns).

KELLY UNVEILS VISION FOR EXPANSION: Vice President of Athletics Michael Kelly announced the university's vision and commitment to continuing to provide an unparalleled student-athlete and unique fan experiences outlined in a Facilities Master Plan that includes additions and enhancements of facilities for all varsity athletic sports programs.

The vision for the future development of the USF Athletics district includes facility investments that have already been achieved in the last year, conceptual plans for many facilities currently in development, and highlights future initiatives in the beginning planning stages that will continue to evolve.

Many facility enhancements that are part of the plan have already been achieved in the last year or are nearing completion within the next year. These include a \$22-million Indoor Performance Facility set to open this fall; a \$3-million football locker room and office renovation completed last summer, a \$2-million television broadcast facility completed in 2020, a \$1-million resurfacing of the running surface at the USF Track & Field Stadium, installation of new hydrotherapy pools in the Lee Roy Selmon Center, and \$1.2-million in enhancements to The Corral for USF volleyball that include a new Taraflex floor, bleachers, nutrition bar, videoboard and roof among many enhancements.

New facility additions included in the plan include the addition of an on-campus football and lacrosse stadium by the 2026 season, a baseball and softball clubhouse, a tennis facility, a complete overhaul of the golf practice facility, and USF Track & Field Stadium additions of a new press box and video board. Plans for the recently announced Beach Volleyball program include building a new facility adjacent to the Yuengling Center and providing renovated coaches' offices and a locker room. Women's lacrosse will utilize a new locker room and coaches' offices in the Lee Roy Selmon Center and will begin play in Corbett Stadium before moving into the on-campus stadium.

Current facilities also slated for enhancement include the Lee Roy Selmon Athletics Center – which will include a complete renovation of the entrance lobby – and Corbett Soccer Stadium – which includes enhanced fan areas, a new video board and a new press box. Also planned is a renovation of the Muma Basketball Center lobby and other player areas.

BAY AREA PRIDE

For the 2022 season, the Bulls added two new marks to their jerseys to display their pride in the great Bay area community. USF placed "Tampa Bay" across the back of its helmets and developed a new state of Florida patch that outlines the seven Bay area counties in green with the iconic "U" logo visible within them.



NEW RADIO PARTNER

USF Athletics finalized a three-year radio partnership agreement with COX Media Group that makes 100,000-watt 102.5 FM The Bone and its high-definition counterpart, 102.5 HD-2, the flagship stations for USF Football broadcasts starting this fall. Their 100,000-watt, over-theair FM signal reaches from Pasco County in the north to Naples in the south and east to Orlando. USF – one of the first two universities in the nation to launch its own 24-hour, digital radio station – will continue to broadcast on its digital outlet, Bulls Unlimited, over the Tuneln app and other digital radio platforms. USF Football games will air live on 102.5 FM and also on its high-definition sister station 102.5 HD-2, which is available on most receivers made after 2016. The Bulls Unlimited digital radio station will continue to carry all USF football games and nearly all other USF Athletics radio broadcasts to a worldwide audience.



KICKOFF LUNCHEON SELLS OUT

The USF Football Kickoff Luncheon entered its third season in 2022 and sold out for the first time with more than 530 fans in attendance at Armature Works near the Hillsborough River in downtown Tampa.

25TH ANNIVERSARY SEASON

USF celebrated its 25th season of football in 2021 after the program hit the field in 1997 after an initial season of only practices and scrimmages in 1996. The University was founded in 1956 but didn't field a football team for another 41 years. After the first football feasibility meeting in 1991 and formal approval by the State Board of Regents in 1995, the Bulls debuted as a Division I-AA (Football Championship Subdivision) program on Sept. 6, 1997 with an 80-3 victory against NCAA Division II Kentucky Wesleyan at the old Tampa Stadium. When USF football debuted, the university's enrollment was 36,649 (it's now 50,830). USF's overall operating budget has advanced from \$500-million to \$1.857-billion during the 25-year football era, while USF's economic impact on the Tampa Bay region has gone from \$1.1-billion to \$4.4-billion.

BULLS FASTEST TO REACH TOP 10

- In 2007, USF became the fastest program in the modern AP Poll Era to go from inception to a Top 10 national ranking as the Bulls were ranked No. 6 in the Week 5 AP Poll in just the program's 11th season. The Bulls would climb all the way to the No. 2 ranking two weeks later in Week 7 to become the fastest to reach a Top 5 ranking.
- The Bull have reached a Top 25 ranking in seven seasons, including three straight (2016-18), and been ranked a total of 48 weeks, including 12 in the top 15.

FASTEST TO 150 WINS IN FLORIDA

With a victory over ECU in 2018, USF became the fastest Florida FBS program to reach 150 wins.

BEATING NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP PROGRAMS

USF has defeated 12 programs with an NCAA-recognized FBS national championship, including wins against Army, Auburn, BYU, Clemson, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Illinois, Miami, Notre Dame, Pittsburgh, Syracuse and TCU.

39 WAS FINE

Jeff Scott, now 41, turned 39 on Dec. 28, 2019, just weeks after accepting the USF job. His former position coach and head coach at Clemson, Dabo Swinney, was also 39 when he ascended to the head coaching job at Clemson, leaving his position as wide receivers coach, which he then tabbed Scott, who was a GA on the staff, to fill. Another notable 39-year-old first time head coach was Jim Leavitt, who left Bill Snyder's staff at Kansas State to begin the USF program as its first head coach in 1996 when he was 39.

THE SWINNEY TREE

Jeff Scott is the first true branch of the Dabo Swinney coaching tree and has followed a remarkably similar path. Swinney has led Clemson since 2008 and Scott was with him during the entire rise of the program to national dominance that saw five straight CFP appearances and two national titles in the final five years of Scott's tenure.

■ Wide Receivers Coach Tradition: Dabo Swinney was a walk-on wide receiver at Alabama and was hired by his Alabama position coach, Tommy Bowden, when Bowden got the head coaching job at Clemson. Scott was a three-year letterman wide receiver at Clemson and was coached by Swinney, who promoted him to his first primary FBS coaching position in 2008 to replace Swinney at wide receivers coach after Swinney became the head coach. Scott's first wide receivers coach on his USF staff was Xavier Dye, who played for Scott at Clemson, and is now coaching tight ends and serves as recruiting coordinator.

HUNTER CONNECTS TAMPA & CLEMSON

Jeff Scott and his wife, Sara, welcomed their first son on Aug. 10, 2020, as he joined sister, Savannah. The couple, who had spent most of the previous two decades in Clemson, S.C., decided to name their son Hunter in honor of standout Clemson wide receiver and now NFL receiver Hunter Renfrow, whom Scott coached at Clemson. The name was chosen as a symbolic connection between Clemson and Tampa. As many will remember, Renfrow caught the gamewinning pass in the Tigers 2016 CFP National Championship win over Alabama in the corner of the end zone at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa. Scott called the game-winning play as co-offensive coordinator at the time and when he first arrived in Tampa upon being named USF head coach, he visited Raymond James Stadium and reenacted that play in the corner of the end zone.





#BAYMADE FOCUSED ON CULTIVATING HOMEGROWN TALENT

Jeff Scott has focused USF's recruiting on the state of Florida and particularly the Bay area and its seven surrounding counties.

- USF's priority order for recruiting is: 1) the Bay area (100 mile radius); 2) the state of Florida (10 broken into geographic areas), 3) bordering and nearby states (GA, AL, SC, NC); 4) national.
- Within a 100-mile radius of Tampa there are 121 high schools. There are close to 100 Division I players recruited nationally from the area annually.
- Each USF coach is assigned 12 schools in Area (with one getting 13) as the Bulls build on the benefit of players being able to have their family involved in the program, see them play regularly, go home regularly and play for their city as well as the benefit of building their brand in a thriving metropolitan economic area of over 4 million people and numerous large businesses and professional opportunities.
- The 2022 Bulls' roster <u>features 27 players from</u> the Bay area, including <u>11 projected in the two deep</u> to start the 2022 season.
- 76 of the players on USF's roster hail from the state of Florida. That represents 65 percent of the roster with Georgia (9) and South Carolina (6) being the next closest states in producing current Bulls.
- Among the Bay area standouts on the Bulls' 2022 roster are: running back Brian Battie, left tackle Donovan Jennings, guards Mike Lofton and Zach Perkins, cornerbacks Aamaris Brown and TJ Robinson, safeties Mekhi LaPointe and T-Mac Simpson, defensive linemen Darien Grant, linebacker DJ Gordon, and placekicker Spencer Shrader.



DID YOU KNOW?

QB Gerry Bohanon Academics shaped the life of Bohanon. His principal at Earle (Arkansas) High School was his

mother, Juanita. He often did homework on the bus rides to road games. He finished his undergraduate degree in 2 1/2 years at Baylor University.

- ✓ WR Khafre Brown Brown was named for the Egyptian king Khafre, who built the second largest pyramid of Giza during his 66-year reign, concluding somewhere around 2570 B.C. Brown's mother was intrigued after seeing a picture of Khafre's statue in a book. Brown does paintings for a hobby. He specializes in sunsets, usually in a beach or skyline setting. He picked up the hobby from his mother, who is an artist.
- ✓ DT Rashad Cheney After transferring from Minnesota, Cheney has reunited with his old friend LB Antonio Grier. Cheney and Grier first met at age 4 when they were in the same daycare facility in Atlanta.
- ✓ OL Demontrey Jacobs The mother of OT Demontrey Jacobs, Venessa Jacobs, is the head volleyball coach at Southern University.
- ✓ DT Nick Bags Nick Bags shortened his last name after his high-school coaches had trouble spelling and pronouncing "Bagashvili." Bags' mother immigrated to New York from the country of Georgia, which seceded from the Soviet Union in 1992. For two years, Bags lived with his grandmother in Georgia, then returned to New York as a third-grader and had to learn English.
- ✓ LB Antonio Grier Grier is president of his fraternity at USF. Grier also regularly visits teenage kids and young men at the Hillsborough County Detention Center

to learn about their lives and share positive messages about how they can improve.

- ✓ P Andrew Stokes is 28 years old and the Bulls second straight punter to come out of Prokick in Australia. He had never played in a football game when he arrived at USF. Stokes spent seven years playing Australian rules football with the Railways in the Great Northern Football League, then Freemantle of the West Australia Football League.
- ✓ K Spencer Shrader was home schooled in high school and was a standout soccer player, scoring a school-record 33 goals in a season for Newsome HS and had a professional tryout in Brazil (for three months in 2018). He came to play football on a relative whim, as a Newsome junior he was kicking footballs simply because they happened to be nearby when the football coach at the time, Ken Hiscock, was walking nearby and said he was stopped short "by the sound." He founded an online company (CopperFox Technologies) that does brand design, web development and sales force integration. He and his family work together on a nonprofit organization, Liberty Villages, which builds Christian communities dedicated to education, entrepreneurship, freedom and peace.
- ✓ G Demetris Harris had both parents serve in the Navv. Demetris Harris Sr. and Stephanie Harris both served approximately 12 years, where they met.
- ✓ LB Coach Ernie Sims was ranked the No. 1 recruit in the nation by Rivals in 2003 before signing with Florida State where he became an ESPN first team All-American linebacker and went on to be the No. 9 overall pick in the 2006 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions in 2006. Sims played eight NFL seasons with four teams and the Tallahassee native recorded 623 tackles in the NFL.



FREAKS LIST

Safety Will Jones, a transfer from Kansas State and maybe USF's fastest player, was named on Bruce Feldman's annual college football "Freaks List" for The Athletic, which sited his being clocked at over 22 mph on the team's GPS tracker and his ability to squat 600 pounds and bench 375 while weighing just 190 pounds.

Jones was supposed to be a major factor last season. Two days before the Bulls' opener at NC State, on an inconsequential non-contact play with about five minutes remaining in the week's final practice, Jones suffered a torn ACL. He was done for the season — before it even began.. A few USF coaches and players said the thought of it nearly made them physically ill. Nearly 365 days later, Jones has returned. He said he hasn't surrendered any speed. In fact, he feels faster. He's not necessarily looking to make up for lost time, but his urgency is clear.

When Bob Shoop became USF's defensive coordinator last December, he arrived early for his first official day at the office. One player waited outside the door.

It was Bulls safety Will Jones.

"That showed me something," Shoop said. "It showed me how eager he was for success, how determined he was to come back. I believe he will be a major factor for our defense.'

21 EARLY ENROLLEES

USF welcomed a program record 21 early enrolllees from the 2022 Class to campus in January. They have worked with the Bulls through winter workouts and will take the field during spring drills.

TRANSFER TALENT

Jeff Scott has welcomed numerous transfers since taking the reins of the Bulls, including 30 four-year college transfers on the 2022 roster - with 22 from FBS programs and 19 from Power Five programs. Starting the 2022 season, 24 transfers are projected in the two deep (12 on defense, 10 on offense and two specialists) with nine projected as starters - including at quarterback and running back. Among the schools players have come to USF from are: Auburn, Baylor, Clemson, Colorado, Kansas State, Maryland, Miami, Minnesota, Missouri, North Carolina, Rutgers, Tennessee and Virginia Tech.

MONEY DOWNS

USF calls third downs "Money Downs" as the opportunity to extend a drive or get the defense off the field. The offense yells out "Money" on third downs while the defense yells "Cash" to ensure all players on the field are aware of the situation

WATCH LIST WAVE

Following several seasons of sparse presence on national award watch lists, the Bulls enter 2022 appearing on eight such lists, the program's most since appearing on 14 watch lists entering the 2017 season after posting an 11-2 record and finishing in the Top 25 in 2016.

SUPER SENIORS

Head coach Jeff Scott was very pleased with his team's leadership heading into the spring, specifically identifying the Bulls' "Super Seniors" for rising to the top and leading. USF has 12 "Super Seniors" - players who elected to use an extra year of COVID eligibility - on the roster. They are: Dwayne Boyles (LB), Brad Cecil (C), Darrien Grant (DE), Antonio Grier (LB), Jatorian Hansford (DE), Demetris Harris (G), Demontrey Jacobs (RT), Donovan Jennings (LT), Mehki LaPointe (S), Latrell Williams (WR), Rashawn Yates (DT). Safety Vincent Davis also chose to come back but was forced to retire due to injury.

- Six "Super Seniors" ranked among the top 8 of the Bulls "Grit" rankings following winter workouts. All 12 ranked among the Top 25.
- Super Senior center Brad Cecil led all players in "Grit" rankings after summer workouts.

USF FOOTBALL FACILITY IMPROVEMENTS



Entering 2021, USF completed a \$3.3 million upgrade to its current football facilities, including:

- A completely renovated locker room featuring: 120 lockers, state of the art digital lighting and surround sound system, a team lounge with two 86" big screen TVs, video game console, pool table, ping-pong table and furnishings, a nutrition fueling station, new LED graphics and 55" monitors throughout.
- New entry ways, graphics and carpeting throughout the operations area.
- New team room graphics and chairs.
- Renovated coaches offices and staff rooms with new furniture, graphics and carpeting.

INDOOR PERFORMANCE FACILITY

USF is completin an 88,000-square foot indoor facility this fall at a cost of approximately \$22 million, which will feature a 100-yard turf field, climate control, branded lobby and observation deck slated for completion prior to the start of the 2022 season.

ON CAMPUS STADIUM/FOOTBALL CENTER

USF has plans to build on on-campus stadium which will include a USF Football Center that will serve as a new home for USF football with coaches offices, meeting spaces, weight room, locker room, training and equipment areas and player lounge among the amenities. The stadium is targeted for completion in 2026.

OFFENSIVE NOTES STARTING QUARTERBACK

Scott named a starting quarterback following the first fall camp scrimmage as he went with junior Baylor transfer Gerry Bohanon over incumbent returniing sophomore Timmy McClain, who transferred to UCF. Returning sophomore Katravis Marsh and true freshman Byrum Brown appear to be the primary backups. In May the Bulls welcomed Bohanon, who started 12 games last season and helped the Bears to a Big 12 championship and Sugar Bowl victory against Ole Miss. Marsh, a bigarmed prospect with an NFL body, has started two in his career to date. Scott said a staff member told him there was one car in the USF facility parking lot on Memorial Day. It belonged to Bohanon, who was inside watching film on his own

film on his own.

The Bulls had seven different starting quarterbacks the past four years since the graduation of standout Quinton Flowers who led the Bulls to 30 wins in three years as the starter.

AROUND THE HORN

Sophomore Jimmy Horn Jr. continued to put his speed on display in the season-opener vs. BYU - posting an 89-yard kickoff return touchdown to open the second half, the 14th in program history and just the 10th USF player to do it.

Horn's 80-yard touchdown reception against Cincinnati in 2021 was the longest play from scrimmage by a USF freshman in program history and stands as the eigth-longest touchdown catch in USF history and helped him to record his second 100-yard receiving game of the

season with five catches for a career-best 108 yards (95 after the catch).

■ He finished second on the team with 30 receptions for 408 yards in 2021, his true freshman season.

BULLS SET PROGRAM RUSHING RECORD

In a highlight of the 2021 season, USF dominated the line of scrimmage and the ball in a 34-14 victory over Temple (10.23.21) to post the first AAC victory under Jeff Scott.

- Set a program record with 421 rushing yards, eclipsing the mark of 416 set at Memphis on Nov. 12, 2016. The Bulls 73 rushing attempts on the night were one off the program record of 74 set at San Jose State in 2017.
- Set a program record in time of possession, logging 44:35 to smash the record of 39:45 set vs.UCF in 2005.
- Set a record with 27 rushing first downs, smashing the previous mark of 21 vs. Illinois in 2017.
- Posted a season high in total yards (526) and rushing yards (421) and first downs (34).
- USF had two players (Jaren Mangham (152) and Kelley Joiner (126) run for 100-yards or more. Mangham posted a career-high tying 26 carries for 152 yards and two touchdowns.

MANGHAM STYLE

Colorado transfer running back Jaren Mangham (6-2, 231) established himself as the Bulls' go-to redzone option in 2021, logging 15 rushing touchdowns on the year.

- Added 10 pounds to his rugged frame for 2022.
- Mangham scored a 1-yard TD run in the season-opener vs. BYU and now has 16 rushing TD in 13 games at USF (12th) and 21 for his career (5 at Colorado).
- Mangham ranked No. 13 nationally with 15 rushing TD in 2021, which tied for the second-best season mark in USF history and three short of the record of 18 set by

Quinton Flowers in 2016.

- His string of at least one TD in SEVEN games (Florida to ECU) tied for second all-time at USF. He had six games with multiple TD on the year.
- He set a USF record posting at least two rushing TDs in FOUR straight games (2 vs. Florida, 3 vs. FAMU, 2 at BYU, 2 at SMU).
- Mangham ran for three touchdowns vs. Florida A&M (2, 4 & 9), the most for a USF player in a game since the 2018 season and tied for the third-most all-time.

BIG PLAY WEAVER

After a breakout season in 2021 that saw 6-1, 180-pound Xavier Weaver earn first-team All-AAC honors from Pro Football Focus and second-team from Pro Football Network as he led the Bulls with 41 catches for 715 yards and a 17.4 ypc, the springy junior looks to rewrite the record books.

- Posted his second career 100-yard receiving game with 113 on five catches vs. BYU (9.3) in the season-opener, including catches of 50, 27 and 21 yards.
- He has 1,130 career yards receiving and 66 receptions, needing just 404 yards to enter the Top 5 all-time at USF (1,006 from the record of 2,136) and 38 catches to enter the Top 10 (record is 153).
- He led USF in receiving yards in 8 of 11 games he played in 2021 and led USF with career-bests of 715 receiving yards (10th in a season at USF) and 41 receptions on the year.
- His 715 yards in 2021 rank 5th all-time for a season at USF and were just 164 shy of Marquez Valdes-Scantling's season mark of 879 set in 2017.
- His 17.3 ypc in 2021 ranks 10th all-time in a season at USF and led The American.
- Weaver also proved to be a potent punt returner logging an average of 12.9 ypr on nine returns that would have ranked No. 6 nationally if he had two more returns.
- Has a tattoo of Uncle Penny Bags, the banker from the Monopoly game, on his left shin because "I like to be money in every sense of the word."
- His father, Sean Weaver, played four seasons with the San Diego Chargers.
- He is the first player from Orlando Christian Prep to sign with a Division I-A school.

ALL-AMERICAN BATTIE (BAT-TEE)


Kick Returner/Running Back Brian Battie (Sarasota/Sarasota HS) became just the second Bull to earn Consensus All-America honors in 2021 and the first since defensive end George Selvie did so in 2007.

- Tied an NCAA RECORD with two 100-yard kickoff returns in the same game vs. Houston (including the game's opening kickoff), joining Utah's Reggie Dunn (2012, vs. Cal).
- LED THE NCAA with three kickoff returns for TD on the year and ranked No. 5 nationally averaging 32.5 ypr.
- Set USF season and career records with three kickoff returns for touchdowns in 2021 and his return average broke the mark set by J.R. Reed in 2003 when he led the nation with a 31.7 ypr average.
- Has the explosive potential to be the next outstanding Bay area back for the Bulls, following in the footsteps of current Houston Texan and 3,600-yard USF rusher Marlon Mack, also a Sarasota native (Booker HS).
- Posted his second career 100-yard rushing game with 110 on just 10 carries (11.0 ypc) vs. Florida A&M (9.18), marking his second 100-yard game in a four game span, posting 102 (6.8 ypc) vs. UCF in the last game of 2020.
- He has led USF in rushing four times in his young career.

SWEET PAD!

Raymond James Stadium hosted Super Bowl 55 on Feb. 7, 2021, as the Bucs defeated the Chiefs in the stadium's third Super Bowl. It also hosted the 2017 CFP Championship game. In recent years, the stadium has undergone major upgrades securing its stature among the finest venues:

- The first venue IN THE WORLD to feature Sportsbeam LED Field Lighting, which allows for 2.1 million color combinations and 100s of lighting effects. (2020)
- The addition of 5G network connectivity. (2020)
- \$10.4 million in COVID-19 mitigation, cleaning and



- Nearly \$160 million in uprades (2018), including: a new 8,000-square-foot, full-service premium sports bar, new East & West Stadium Clubs that include sleek new bars, a club lounge, massive video displays, 162 TVs, and a state-of-the-art audio system, concourse and concession enhancements and locker rooms.
- state of the art, high visibility 9,600-square-foot video displays in both end zones along with the addition of a new 2,300-square-foot video towers in each corner and stadium ribbon board. All together, the video displays cover more than 28,000-square-feet, making Raymond James Stadium the third-largest video displays in the United States.



Not only does USF return all five offensive line starters from 2021, but also the longest tenured offensive line coach at USF since 2012

- USF since 2012.

 Assistant Head Coach Allen Mogridge returns to coach the offensive line for the third straight season, becoming the longest tenured Bulls coach at the position since Steve Shankweiler led the unit from 2010-12.
- USF has had seven offensive line coaches since 2012, with an average tenure of 1.4 years over the last 10 years and five serving for just one season.
- Super Senior offensive linemen Brad Cecil, Demetris Harris and Donovan Jennings have all started games in four seasons and played for three offensive line coaches
- seasons and played for three offensive line coaches.

 Brad Cecil is a 2022 Campbell Trophy candidate for achievement on the field, classroom and community.

O-LINE CHASING CAREER STARTS MARKS; LEAD NATION IN STARTS ENTERING 2022

All five starters return on the offensive line - LT Donovan Jennings, LG Demetris Harris, C Brad Cecil, RG Dustyn Hall & RT Demontrey Jacobs – returned in 2022 representing a combined 136 career starts. Jennings, Harris and Cecil have started alongside each other for the past four seasons and each brought at least 31 starts into 2022 with Harris (41) and Cecil (38) leading all Bulls returners in career starts and with a chance to both finish not only as the most prolific starting offensive linemen in program history (passing Quinterrius Eatmon), but at the top of the all-time Bulls career starts chart.

THE OFFENSIVE BRAIN TRUST

First-year offensive coordinator Travis Trickett said USF's offense will be a fast-paced, attacking unit. The presence of senior analyst Chad Morris, the former Clemson offensive coordinator and head coach at SMU and Arkansas, can't be overstated, either. Trickett is longtime believer in the offensive philosophy espoused by Morris and has integrated many elements of it in offenses in his previous stops and at USF. Scott put it into extremely effective practice at Clemson, first working with Morris Clemson and later when Scott took over as the Tigers' co-offensive coordinator. Now

they are all together and joined by fellow Bulls offensive coaches with Clemson lineage in running backs coach Cam Aiken and tight ends coach Xavier Dye. It's about finding the right matchups and putting the ball in the hands of playmakers. Even in training camp, the possibilities abound.

DEFFENSIVE NOTES GRIER GONE WILD

Senior linebacker Antonio Grier has led the Bulls in tackles, TFL and sacks the last two seasons.

- Earned second team all-conference in both 2021 and 2020.
- Grier enters 2022 as USF's top returner in career tackles and TFL with with 209 and 22.0, respectively. Fellow linebacker Dwayne Boyles is right behind with 206 and 21.5, respectively.
- Led USF with 92 tackles, 8 TFL and 3 sacks in 2021 after leading the team with 59 tackles, 3.0 sacks and 5.5 TFL in a COVID-shortened 2020 season.
- Recorded his first career interception vs. Tulsa (10.16. 21) and made it memorable as he weaved through traffic on a 69-yard touchdown return that stands as the third-longest in program history and the longest ever by a linebacker.

BOYLES AT HEART OF BULLS DEFENSE

Linebacker Dwayne Boyles led USF in tackles (75) and tackles for loss (12.5) in 2019, had his 2020 season limited by missing action, and finished second on the team with 68 tackles in 2021

- Led USF with a career-best 14 tackles and added a fumble recovery at ECU in 2021 to give him three straight games involved with forcing a turnover.
- Posted interceptions in back-to-back games at SMU (10.2.21) and vs. Tulsa (10.16.21)

FEELING A RUSH

USF's defense had just nine sacks last season, so clearly that's a priority for first-year defensive coordinator Bob Shoop. "Our aim is to be an in-your-face style defense," Shoop said. "We want to be built on relentless pursuit and never-ending pressure. We will tailor our scheme to the strength and skill-sets of our personnel. But no question, our identity will be based around creating pressure." Shoop will emphasize defensive-line depth. If there are 75 snaps in the game, Shoop said starters will ideally play 40 to 50. New players to watch include transfers Jatorian Hansford (Missouri), Rashad Cheney (Minnesota), Nick Bags (Temple) and Jonathan Ross (Bowie State). True freshmen Michael Williams II, a four-star prospect who was offered scholarships by a handful of Big Ten and SEC programs, and Eddie Kelly also bear watching. Holdovers Rashawn Yates and Tramel Logan were spring standouts. "We're going to have a lot of fresh bodies at all times," Shoop said. "That's going to allow us to play our best in the fourth quarter and a junior.

- Transfer DE Jatorian Hansford recorded USF's lone sack in the 2022 season-opener vs. BYU.
- DE Tramel Logan, who added nearly 20 pounds in the offseason, produced a career-best two TFL vs. BYU.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES GETTING HIS KICKS

Kicker Spencer Shrader, a former soccer player who walked on to the team in 2019, is had a career year in 2021 and was named a LOU GROZA AWARD Semifinalist.

- Shrader went 11-for-13 on field goal attempts. He made nine straight to start the year before missing from 51 yards, marking the third-longest string in program history four behind the program record for most consecutive field goals made (13 by Emilio Nadelman from Sept. 15-Oct. 21, 2017 and Marvin Kloss from Aug. 31-Dec. 7, 2013).
- Dating to the 2019 season, Shrader has converted on 15 of his last 17 attempts. Shrader's string includes made field goals of 52, 49, 49, 47, 46, 44, 42 and 41 yards.
- Against Temple (10.23), Shader hit a 52-yarder to tie for the third longest made field goal in program history.

PENALTY FREE

In its second full season under head coach Jeff Scott, USF set a program record for the fewest number of penalties and penalty yards in a season.

- The Bulls' 61 penalties in 2021 beat the old record of 74 set in 2010 by 13 and ranked 28th nationally at 5.0 per game.
- The Bulls' 553 penalty yards in 2021 beat the old mark of 599 set in 2010 by 46 yards and ranked 41st nationally at 46 yards per game.
- Both marks are steep declines from 2017 when the Bulls had 111 penalties for 1,032 yards, both ranking among the top three most penalized seasons in program history.

CHALLENGING SCHEDULE

A fast start would be great for USF's confidence, but the Bulls will be challenged by a rigorous schedule. Three of the first four games — BYU on Sept. 3, at Florida on Sept. 17 and at Louisville on Sept. 24 — will be against top-50 programs that played in Bowl games last year, with two coming on the road. USF also visits the American Athletic Conference's top two teams — Cincinnati (Oct. 8) and Houston (Oct. 29) — while hosting UCF in the War on I-4 during Thanksgiving weekend. The preseason AAC poll voted Houston as the favorite to win the conference followed by Cincinnati and UCF. Nine of the Bulls 12 regular season opponents received a bowl or College Football Playoff bid in 2021 and three finished ranked in the top 20.

AMERICA'S FASTEST RISING UNIVERSITY

U.S. News and World Report released its latest higher education rankings (2021) and the University of South Florida continues to be America's fastest-rising university, according to U.S. News. Over the past 10 years, USF has risen 48 spots among public universities from No. 94 to No. 46 and 67 spots among all universities (public or private), from No. 170 to No. 103. No other university in the country has risen so far so quickly. This also marks the third year in a row that USF is ranked in the top 50 among public universities.

- Designated a "Preeminent State Research University" by the Florida board of governors in 2018, USF is in elite company with the University of Florida and Florida State University as the only three state universities to earn the designation.
- USF enrollment surpassed 50,000 students for the first time in the fall of 2017, now with 50,830 students currently enrolled across the three campuses: USF Tampa, USF St. Petersburg and USF Sarasota-Manatee.
- USF is the nation's 7th leading public university in generating new United States utility patents and ranks 16th among universities worldwide.



CHAMPA BAY!

The Bay area has staked a claim as the epicenter of championshsip sports teams in recent years. Home to four professional sports organizations, including the MLB Rays, NHL Lightning, NFL Buccanneers and USL Rowdies. All have had outstanding championship seasons in the last two years, making celebratory boat parades on the Hillsborough River in downtown Tampa a common occurrence..

- Since 2020, the Bay Area has claimed a Super Bowl Champion, two Stanley Cups, an American League Pennant and a USL Conference Championship.
- The Tampa Bay Lightning repeated as Stanley Cup champions in 2021, downing the Montreal Canadiens (4-1) in the Stanley Cup Finals. The Lightning also won the Cup in 2020 and back in 2004. They have reached the Stanley Cup finals in three straight years: 2020, 2021 and 2022.
- The Tampa Bay Buccaneers acquired sure Hall of Fame players Tom Brady and Rob Gronkowski prior to the 2020 season and went on to down the Kansas City Chiefs (31-9) to win Super Bowl 55 in Raymond James Stadium. The Buccaneers became the first team in NFL history to play in and win a Super Bowl that was held at its home stadium. The Bucs also won a Super Bowl in 2002.
- The Tampa Bay Rays posted 100 wins and had the best record in the American League. They won pennant and reached the 2020 World Series, falling to the Los Angeles Dodgers in six games. The Rays also reached the 2008 World Series. The Rays established ace is former USF pitcher Shane McClanahan.
- The Tampa Bay Rowdies soccer team won its conference and reached the USL Championship final in 2020 and again in 2021.





BULLS HELP HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

The USF team loaded up the buses and headed across the bay to Pinellas County to assist Habitat for Humanity in getting seven houses ready for occupancy. The Bulls spent two hours painting, laying sod, digging holes for plantings, mulching, hanging storm shutters and moving construction materials. The players were divided into different teams painting, shoveling, planting, and doing everything else it takes to make a house a home. "It means the world to have a group of young men like this that are trying to establish themselves through school and through football—come out, swing a hammer and help other families in our community," a spokesperson for Habitat for Humanity said.



THE USF FOOTBALL PROGRAM

- The Bulls have had five head coaches in 26 seasons.
- USF was ranked for a program record 20 straight weeks (2016-2017) has spent 48 weeks in the Top 25.
- The Bulls reached as highly as the No. 2 ranking in 2007, becoming the fastest program to go from inception to a top 10 ranking in FBS history.
- USF has played in 10 bowl games and won six.
- USF has claimed victories in Tampa over Louisville, West Virginia, Georgia Tech, Pittsburgh, Kansas and North Carolina among others.
- USF has claimed road or neutral site wins over Florida State, Auburn, Clemson, Notre Dame, Miami, Louisville, NC State, West Virginia and TCU among others.
- USF has had 30 first-team All-Conference selections, including 1 Offensive Player of the Year, 1 Defensive Player of the Year, 2 Special Teams Players of the Year and 1 Rookie of the Year.
- USF has had six players selected a first-team All-American a total of seven times.
- 14 USF players have been part of 18 Super Bowl teams, 10 part of a Super Bowl Champion, including 2020 as Bay area product Austin Reiter (Chiefs) and Jason Pierre-Paul (Buccaneers) went head to head.

JPP NAMED TO NFL TOP 100

USF first team All-American defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul (2009) has gone on to earn three NFL Pro Bowl selections (2012, 2013, 2020) and a pair of Super Bowl Championships (2012, New York Giants & 2020, Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He was named to the NFL Top 100 players for 2020-21.

- 57 schools had a player named to the NFL Top 100, but only three in Florida: USF, FSU & FAU
- USF was one of just three AAC schools with an NFL Top 100 player: USF, SMU & Cincinnati
- USF has had 14 players make a total of 18 appearances in the Super Bowl, including Chiefs' Center Austin Reiter and Pierre-Paul facing each other in Super Bowl LV in Tampa. With JPP becoming the first Bulls' player to earn two Super Bowl titles.

USF has produced 10 Super Bowl Champions, including Reiter the year before with the Chiefs.

TWO DECADES OF PULLING RANK

The Bulls will face several ranked teams in 2022. Since becoming a full FBS program in 2001, USF has registered 11 victories against opponents ranked in the Associated Press top 25 (including three wins against the top 10, four road victories and triumphs against opponents from the ACC, Big 12 and SEC). In that 21-season span, only two other American Athletic Conference programs have more victories against ranked opponents than USF.

Scott helped lead the Clemson to five straight College Football Playoff appearances, four CFP Championship games and national titles in the 2016 and 2018 seasons while coaching in nine CFP games and posting a 6-3 record.

HEAD COACH JEFF SCOTT

3rd Season at USF/3rd Season Overall

Clemson, 2003

Named the fifth head coach in USF football history on Dec. 9, 2019, Jeff Scott was one of the most respected coordinators and recruiters in the nation when he took over the Bulls program.

Having served as the co-offensive coordinator at Clemson since 2015 and as a member of the Tigers' football staff at his alma mater since 2008, Scott was a key part of the rise of one of the most dominant football programs in the nation. He helped lead the Tigers to five straight College Football Playoff appearances, four CFP Championship game appearances (2015, 2016, 2018 & 2019 seasons) and national titles in the 2016 and 2018 seasons while coaching in nine CFP Playoff games and posting a 6-3 record. Scott returns to a home field in Raymond James Stadium where Clemson scored 21 fourth-quarter points to defeat Alabama, 35-31, in the CFP National Championship game on Jan. 9, 2017 to claim the program's first national title in 35 years.

SCOTT NOTABLES

- ▶ In his five seasons serving as co-offensive coordinator/wide receivers coach, Clemson posted a 70-5 record and claimed five ACC championships.

- ▶ During his stint as co-offensive coordinator, the Tigers went 70-5 (38-2 in the ACC) with just two regular season losses and posted the four winningest seasons in program history (2018 (15-0), 2019 (14-1), 2015 (14-1), 2016 (14-1)).
- ▶ Clemson averaged 40 points and 500 yards per game, while Tigers quarterbacks completed better than 66 percent of their passes. Clemson averaged better than 500 yards per game in four seasons and set 138 team and individual records, including marks for total offense (527.2 ypg), scoring offense (44.3 ppg), passing offense (5,009 yards), rushing offense (3,723 yards) and touchdowns (90).
- ▶ The top three total offense seasons in program history came with Scott as co-offensive coordinator, as did the top three scoring seasons, all with 577 points or better.

FLORIDA & COACHING IN THE BLOOD

- ▶ Born in Arcadia, Fla., just an hour and a half south (93 miles) of the USF campus.
- ▶ Scott's father, Brad, a 1979 graduate of USF, coached high school football in the state and spent 11 years as an assistant coach to Bobby Bowden at Florida State, including the last four as offensive coordinator and claiming the 1993 national title.
- ▶ During his father's tenure at Florida State, Scott attended elementary school at Florida High Elementary which was across the street, about 200 yards from the FSU practice fields and he would join his father every afternoon at practice after school.

AT HOME IN RAY JAY

▶ Scott returns to a home field in Raymond James Stadium where Clemson scored 21 fourth-quarter points to defeat Alabama, 35-31, in the CFP National Championship game on Jan. 9, 2017 to claim the program's first national title in 35 years.

PRODUCING NFL PLAYERS

- ▶ Eight wide receivers Scott coached were on 2019 NFL rosters, including Bay area products, Ray Ray McCloud, Deon Cain and Artavis Scott.
- ▶ He coached Fort Myers, Fla., product Sammy Watkins, a two-time All-American who set school season records for receptions (101), receiving yards (1,464) and touchdowns (12) and career marks for receptions (240), receiving yards (3,391) and receiving touchdowns (27) before being selected in the first round of the NFL Draft.
- ▶ Under Scott, DeAndre Hopkins earned second-team All-America honors before selection in the first round of the NFL Draft and going on to make four Pro Bowls.

ELITE RECRUITER

- ▶ Scott was Clemson's recruiting coordinator 2008-14, leading the Tigers to top-10 ranked classes in his first season of 2009 and also in 2011 and 2012.
- ▶ He was named a top-10 recruiter nationally by ESPN.com (2014), a top 25 national recruiter seven times by Rivals.com (2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019) and the ACC Recruiter of the Year in 2015 by Rivals and in 2018 by 247Sports.

CLEMSON CONNECTION

Head Coach Jeff Scott is just one of five primary staff connections for the USF program to the Clemson program. Assistant Coaches Da'Quan Bowers and Xavier Dye both played at Clemson and coached at Clemson. Bowers earned consensus All-America honors following his junior season at Clemson in 2010 in which he posted 67 tackles, 26 tackles for loss and led the nation with 15.5 sacks. He earned the Bronko Nagurski Trophy as college football's top defensive player, the Ted Hendricks Award as the nation's top defensive end and the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year award. A dean's list student at Clemson, Dye played wide receiver for the Tigers from 2007-10 and was two-year starter (2009-10). Assistant coach Cam Aiken who worked on Dabo Swinney's staff for nine seasons, serving last season as a senior offensive assistant helping the Tigers to once again return to the College Football Playoff as he worked closely with offensive coordinator Tony Elliott. The most recent Clemson addition is senior offensive analyst Chad Morris. Morris and Scott previously worked together as part of a highly successful offensive staff at Clemson from 2011-14, as the pair helped the Tigers go 42-11 over that four-year span and set the program on a trajectory to win two national championships (2016 and 2018) and make four CFP National Championship game appearances (2015, 2016, 2018, 2019). Morris served as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach and Scott as wide receivers coach/ recruiting coordinator during that period before Morris left to become the head coach at SMU and Scott moved into the role of co-offensive coordinator, which he held through 2019.

BOWDEN DNA RUNS IN USF PROGRAM

The Bobby Bowden influence is unmistakable throughout the Bulls' program. USF head coach Jeff Scott practically grew up on the practice field and in the locker room of Florida State football. That's where he mingled with dozens of All-American players as he tagged along with his father, Brad, a Seminoles assistant. That's where he decided — at age 11 — that he would one day become a college football coach. And that's where he watched and learned from the legendary Bobby Bowden. Scott vividly remembers the classic 1991 game at Doak Campbell Stadium - No. 1-ranked FSU vs. the No. 2 Miami Hurricanes. Scott sat deep in the metal locker area of quarterback Charlie Ward, a future Heisman Trophy winner, while Ward sat on a stool and Bowden came in to address the players. Scott was 3 when the family moved to Tallahassee after his father accepted a position on Bowden's staff in 1983. He was 13 when the Seminoles defeated Nebraska 18-16 on Jan. 1, 1994 at the Orange Bowl, then his father left the next day to become head coach at South Carolina.

Brad Scott, the offensive coordinator on Bowden's first national-championship team, is assisting his son as the USF chief of staff. He served for 11 seasons as an assistant coach at Florida State under Bobby Bowden, the last four seasons as offensive coordinator, helping develop Heisman Trophy winner Charlie Ward and the "Fast Break" offense the Seminoles used to win the 1993 national title.

USF's linebackers coach is Ernie Sims, a Tallahassee native and former FSU All-American who achieved his dream of playing for Bowden. Sims has a photo in his office of Bowden visiting his home during a recruiting session, when Bowden brought the No. 34 jersey (retired to honor former All-American Ron Sellers) and said Sims would be allowed to wear it if he signed with FSU.

YOUNG GUNS

Entering his third season, USF's Jeff Scott is the secondyoungest head football coach in the American Athletic Conference and the 21st-youngest in the Football Bowl Subdivision. Scott is younger than all but one opposing head coach (SMU's Rhett Lashlee) on USF's 2022 schedule after being younger than all coaches he faced in 2020 and 2021. Sophomore **Katravis Marsh** (**6-5, 232**), who started at Cincinnati in 2020 and at ECU in 2021, has played in eight career games, has a strong arm and throws a beautiful deep ball. Freshman **Byrum Brown** (**6-3, 206**) was one of three finalists for North Carolina Mr. Football and joined the Bulls in January. The pro-style quarterback passed for 3,703 yards, 43 TD and four INT as a senior. 2022 Class signee, **Gunnar Smith** (**6-4, 180**), joined the Bulls in the summer after throwing for 2,180 yards and 22 touchdowns in his senior season at Lake Mary High School.

RUNNING BACKS

The Bulls return their top three rushers in Mangham, Joiner and Battie. That group will be bolstered by the return of **K'Wan Powell (5-9, 205)** from a knee injury and the addition of Clemson transfer **Michel Dukes (5-10, 197)**, a top 50 running back out of high school who concluded his prep career with 8,762 yards and 117 touchdowns rushing, and **Jason Albritton (5-10, 225, Lithia, Fla.)**.

2021 leading receiver Xavier Weaver looks to build on a breakout season as he leads the return of USF's top three receivers, including Jimmy Horn and Omarion Dollison (27 catches, 218 yards). USF also welcomes the return of Latrell Williams (22 catches for 260 yards in 2020) from a knee injury, 6-3 Baylor transfer Yusuf Terry (6 for 62), Sean Atkins (6 for 67) and 6-4 Holden Willis (2 for 43). The Bulls upgraded the position in the Class of 2022, including adding Clemson transfer Ajou Ajou (6-3, 218) - 39 catches for 686 yards and seven TD in his senior year at Clearwater Academy, and North Carolina transfer Khafre Brown (6-0, 190), the No. 32-ranked receiver nationally and a four-star prospect.

TIGHT ENDS

Junior Chris Carter (6-4, 236) gives the Bulls a strong blocking presence and sophomore Gunnar Greenwald (6-4, 244) is skilled and athletic. The Bulls added Penn transfer Chris Mottillo (6-6, 258) in the summer. He started eight games and caught four passes for 53 yards for the Quakers before an injury ended his season. Freshman Jayson Littlejohn (6-4, 236) joined the team in the sping and will also be a presence.

OFFENSIVE LINE

The Bulls return all five starters from 2021, including center **Brad Cecil** (6-4, 294), left guard **Demetris Harris** (6-3, 315), left tackle **Donovan Jennings** (6-5, 312), right guard **Dustyn Hall** (6-3, 303) and right tackle **Demontrey Jacobs** (6-6, 315) — representing a combined 136 career starts with Harris (41), Cecil (38) and Jennings (31) having played the better part of four seasons together. Sophomore tackle **Josh Blanchard (6-3, 301)**, returns and hte Bulls added experienced FBS transfers in **Derrell Bailey Jr.** (6-6, 289, Virginia Tech), **Mike Lofton** (6-2, 312, UCF) and **Zach Perkins** (6-5, 315).

DEFENSIVE LINE

The Bulls will have a new look defensive line. Senior Rashawn Yates (6-3, 282) returns after posting 13 tackles and a sack in 2021 as does fellow senior Darien Grant (6-4, 257), returning from injury, junior Jason Vaughn (6-5, 246) - 19 tackles, 1.5 TFL in 2021 - and Tramel Logan (6-2, 249) - 15 tackles, 2 TFL. The Bulls added eight defensive linemen in the 2022 Class, including four-star defensive end Michael Williams (6-3, 247; Farmington Hills, Mich.) - 23.5 sacks in his senior year - and transfers in Nick Bags (6-3, 293, Temple), Rashad Cheney Jr. (6-2, 285, Minnesota), Jatorian Hansford (6-3, 265, Missouri), and Jonathan Ross (6-3, 243, Bowie State). Cheney was a four-star prospect that led his team to a Minnesota state championship with 45 tackles for loss and seven sacks. They are joined by high school signees Jhalin Hobbs (6-2, 291, Ruskin, Fla.), Eddie Kelly (6-4, 274, Orlando, Fla.) and Jacquez Williams (6-2, 293, Savannah, Ga.). Former USF basketball player Bayron Matos (6-9, 286) joined the team in the spring and looks to be a presence on the interior.

LINEBACKER

Dwayne Boyles and Antonio Grier bring a combined 55 starts and 416 tackles (43.5 TFL) into their senior seasons, having held down the middle of the defense the previous three seasons. Redshirt freshman Mac Harris (6-0, 230) returns from a shoulder injury in 2021 after showing some flashes in his true freshman campaign (2020), including eight tackles at Cincinnati. Senior Brian Norris Jr. (6-2, 225), sophomore Davon Hicks (6-0, 215) and redshirt freshman CJ Ross (5-11, 210) bring experience as the Bulls added considerable depth with three linebackers in the 2022 Class, including Minnesota transfer DJ Gordon IV (6-1, 220) - 126 tackles and 26 tackles for loss in his senior year Plant City HS -, DeAunte Hunter (6-4, 198, Valdosta, Ga.), who led Lowndes High School to the Georgia Class 7A quarterfinals, and junior college transfer Jhalyn Shuler (6-2, 220) - 88 tackles and 11 TLF at Coffeyville Community College.

CORNERBACKS

Daguan Evans (11 starts) held down one cornerback position last year while transfer Christian Williams (6-1, 185, Miami) saw action on the other side of the field posting four starts and 20 tackles while grabbing two interceptions. Transfer TJ Robinson (6-3, 194, Rutgers) started seven games and posted 31 tackles as a cornerback in 2021. Senior Josh Green (5-10, 182) saw action in eight games. Transfer Aamaris Brown (5-11, 197, Kansas State) - 80 tackles and 11 interceptions in his senior season at Tampa's Armwod High School - had a strong spring and has become a team leader.

SAFETIES

Returning senior Mekhi LaPointe brings leadership and significant USF experience (21 career starts, 59 tackles in 2021), and junior Matthew Hill started 10 games and posted 50 tackles and an interception in his first season as a safety and at USF. Transfer Will Jones II (5-9, 191, Kansas State) is among the Bulls' fastest players and showed great closing ability on the ball before suffering a torn ACL prior to Game 1 in 2021. Returrners T-Mac Simpson (5-11, 190), Chris Townsel (6-2, 188), Jayden Curry (5-11, 200) and Jaelen Stokes (6-1, 191) all saw significant action in 2021 and transfer Ray Thornton III (6-1, 206, Clemson) - 27 tackles in 15 games at Clemson - bolsters the lineup.

TAMPA, FLA., – USF and BYU had to wait an extra 2:36 to kickoff the 2022 season as inclement weather delayed a scheduled 4 p.m. at Raymond James Stadium to 6:36 p.m. with lightning in the Bay Area. The teams took the field to 31,521 enthusiastic fans, but BYU quickly turned them silent, using their first offensive possession for a 75-yard, jet-sweep touchdown by wide receiver Puka Nacua. BYU built a 28-0 lead in the first quarter after a strong performance from their offense as the Bulls offense struggled to get first downs.

BYU scored a touchdown four of the first five times it touchded the ball, getting a field goal on the sixth. Meanwhile, USF punted four times, lost possession on downs and had a pick-six on its first six possessions.

Following the big strike on the opening possession, BYU quarterback Jaren Hall drove the Cougars 65 and 82-yards for two touchdowns sandwiched around a 33-yd pick-six on an attempted wide receiver screen play by linebacker Max Tooley that gave BYU an early 28-0 lead.

USF got the offense going on the last drive of the half as quarterback Gerry Bohanon, a Baylor transfer making his first start at USF, moved the Bulls 84 yards in eight plays, connecting with wide receiver Xavier Weaver for 71 of those yards.

Jimmy Horn Jr. provided a spark, returning the second half opening kickoff for a touchdown, but USF could not climb back in the game.

- Weaver ended the night with his second career 100-yd game, posting 113 yards on five receptions.
- BYU out-gained USF 575 to 293 on the night, including 314 yards rushing.
- Jimmy Horn Jr. returned the opening kickoff of the second half 89 yards for a touchdown, the first of his career.
- Mekhi LaPointe led USF with 10 tackles and his sixth career interception.(45.1 ypp).

Quotable

"Obviously, it was a very disappointing performance tonight," USF Head Coach Jeff Scott said. "I'm really very surprised honestly. Sometimes as a coach you may see some signs during practice where guys aren't quite locked in or focused. It really was the opposite of that. I felt like we were prepared. Obviously, we weren't."
